The selection can be from such method books as Suzuki for strings, Rubank method books for winds, etc., or other solos or orchestra pieces that you have in your repertoire.

Private string instruction is strongly recommended to support

students' development. This course fulfills one Arts/Humanities credit or an elective credit required for high school graduation and may be repeated for additional credit. Admission is by audition only.

Advanced Orchestra (Full Symphonic Orchestra): This one-year course is designed for students of string, wind, brass, and percussion instruments who have progressed beyond the skills outlined in the Middle School Orchestra syllabus. The curriculum focuses on developing the technical and musical skills required for independent musicianship. Students will explore the rich heritage of orchestral music, studying its evolution in style and genres, articulation, dynamics, rhythm, and tone production throughout history. The course emphasizes the importance of sustained individual and group effort, with a structured progression of technical proficiency expected. Students will participate in a variety of performance opportunities (including after school Jazz Band, if desired) to refine their skills and gain ensemble experience. A basic understanding of music theory is also expected. Pianists with advanced proficiency and strong sight-reading skills, as well as guitar players with exceptional sight-reading ability, may audition for this ensemble. Private instruction is strongly recommended to support students' development. This course fulfills one Arts/Humanities credit or an elective credit required for high school graduation and may be repeated for additional credit. Admission is by audition only.

Intermediate Orchestra (Strings only): This one-year course is designed for bowed string students who have advanced skills beyond Middle School Chamber Orchestra or Beginning Orchestra. Admission is by audition (required for all Middle School students) or instructor approval. The curriculum focuses on developing the skills necessary for independent musicianship and includes an exploration of string literature from 1600 to the present. Students will refine techniques such as third position and higher, double-stopping, vibrato, and harmonics while enhancing articulation, dynamics, rhythm, and tone production. A strong emphasis is placed on sustained group and individual effort, with an expectation of moderate technical proficiency and a foundational understanding of music theory. Students will engage with repertoire at Grade 2 difficulty and higher, with private instruction strongly recommended to support their growth. Performance opportunities are a central component of the course, along with the appropriate integration of technology to support learning and performance preparation. Pianists with highly proficient playing ability and strong sight-reading skills may audition to join the ensemble. This course fulfills one Arts/Humanities credit or an elective credit required for high school graduation and may be repeated for additional credit required for high school graduation and may be repeated.
